Developing Young Leaders - Dion Trezona

Case Study *May 2015*

BACKGROUND

The Developing Future Leaders for Farming Communities on the Eyre Peninsula project aimed to provide young farmers from across upper Eyre Peninsula, South Australia with the confidence and skills to take on leadership roles in their local communities. The project engaged 16 young farmers, chosen from 8 farming groups, in activities to increase the effectiveness of leadership in landcare and agricultural practices, learn what is valued in communities, gain leadership skills, working in a team, and how groups work and can be inspired to see the value of committing to the future.

Why did you get involved in the project?

An invitation from EPARF was extended through the Streaky Bay Agricultural Bureau to participate in developing leadership skills. I was looking at taking my business skills forward with innovation and business management. This project involvement gave me the opportunity to network with peers across the Eyre Peninsula and meet with other like minded people to develop leadership skills in my local community.

What was your involvement in the project?

Attending workshops and taking on the role of President of a young farmer group.

What changes have you made as a result of the project?

Accepted nomination to the EPARF Board of Management as a farmer representative for my area on Eyre Peninsula.
